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FOREWORD

There is a wise Bantu proverb, 'I am because we are'. It means that only by working together in community, can we help each person to grow and live a life of dignity, respect and wellbeing. Together with you, we have made this difference to so many in the Global South this year.

Your generosity has directly affected the lives of 237,548 vulnerable and marginalised people across 15 countries. We responded to the most basic of requests from our partners — clean water to drink, shoes during freezing winter months, basic food hampers to get a family through the month. The needs are so acute, and our resources are little, yet we manage to have a deep and meaningful impact on those we serve.

With your support, we've managed to keep rural schools and teacher training colleges open, in places where our brother Jesuits have been shot and killed.

We've responded to emergencies, that don't hit the headlines, including the Tigray War in Ethiopia which affected me dearly. It claimed the lives of half a million people with large-scale sexual violence by military forces. We responded with relief distributions to over 10,000 people facing starvation.

It is your solidarity, your understanding of how we reach those furthest behind, that enables us to persevere. Your commitment to us, gives us the opportunity to enable those left behind to make real changes in their lives. Mile buiochas agus beannacht.

5. Organisational Development Programme: to encourage best practice in the workplace and maximise the effectiveness and efficiency of our work.


FUNDING

IJI STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK 2022-2027

We launched our Strategic Framework 2022 to 2027 on the 10th August in Milltown, Dublin.

Our Framework outlines our future works and objectives over the next 5 years. This is our fourth strategic framework within IJI and is informed by the new commitments within the Irish Jesuit Province and globally within the Society of Jesus through the Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAPs), which renew our energy in reviewing how we live, how we work, and how we relate to the people serve.



During the lifetime of our last Strategic Framework 2017-2021, our International Development Programme provided over

€7.4 MILLION IN AID, reaching 512,325 DIRECT BENEFICIARIES

in some of the most disadvantaged communities worldwide.

STRATEGIC GOALS















GOAL 1: INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

To improve the quality of life of those who are marginalised, disadvantaged and living in poverty in Africa, Asia and Middle East.

OBJECTIVE 1:

Provide quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities

Education continues to be our key priority as we continue to support partners in nursery, primary, secondary, tertiary education, and vocational skills training.

We focus on education for the marginalised, vulnerable and those living in poverty in line with the UAPs 'Walking with the Excluded' and 'Journeying with Youth'.

In 2022 we continued to support those most in need in areas where there is limited access to education in countries including Cambodia, CAR, Ethiopia, India, Kenya, Lebanon, Malawi, Nigeria, South Sudan, Syria, Taiwan, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia.

Girls Club Podcasts in India

In 2022, we supported our partner JRS India to advocate for educational rights of vulnerable Chin and Afghan refugee children in New Delhi. JRS partnered with existing informal and vocational education initiatives and supported the girls to form 3 Girls Clubs, with 20 members each of ages 15-18 years. These Girls Clubs championed education for refugee girls.

8 awareness sessions were facilitated for the girls on Sexual Gender Based Violence (SGBV), refugee girl child education, child safeguarding, menstrual health and hygiene, peer counselling support, rights of refugee children, girls in peacebuilding and climate crisis.

"I want to say a big thank you for letting me be a part of Radio Podcasting Program. We can share the life of a refugee, we can reconnect with our family and we can help families by sharing their information through radio. That's why this project will affect not only my life but the lives of my family and also the people in my community." Mary San

The Girls Clubs received training in radio podcasting, including speaking skills, audio modulation and content creation. This equipped them not only with new skills but also the ability to raise awareness about the learning rights of refugee children and address pertinent issues.

The Girls' Clubs released 10 Radio Podcasts shared on JRS digital platforms, aiming to bring about positive cultural transformations and highlight the challenges, potential, and learning opportunities for refugee children and girls in the host community.



Girl 4 Girls Club

We supported our partner JRS Nigeria to continue the education project in Adamawa and Borno States, where female primary school attendance is only 47.7%. The Boko Haram insurgency has worsened the situation, causing a crisis that has lasted for over a decade, leaving many girls out of school.

Through this innovative program, a total of 500 girls who were previously out of school have been reintegrated into the education system.

Female teachers have received training on pedagogy and Psychosocial Support (PSS) to better support and counsel the girls. Girls for Girls (G4G) groups have been established to provide ongoing support and supplies such as uniforms, learning materials, stationary and reusable menstrual pads.

Boys have been supported in championing girl education, creating a supportive environment for the girls.

Village Savings and Loans Associations are being established for the mothers of the G4G groups so that they

can generate an income for their household without having to remove their girl child from school.

New Primary School in Akol Jal

Akol Jal is a rural village in South Sudan, still insecure after decades of war. Men sleep in the nearest town of Rumbek, as it is unsafe for them to sleep in the village at night, of fear of being shot.

In 2022, the State Governor brought into law the requirement for children to attend primary school. The local community took the requirement up with zeal and urged the Jesuits to allow their children schooling in the agricultural institute when it wasn't being used by the women farmers for classes. Parents were unwilling to send their children to the next nearest school which was over 12km away, as it would leave their children vulnerable to being attacked along the route.

With this surge in interest, a government permit was issued for the construction of a new school, St Peter Faber Primary School. With support from Ireland we aim to build the block in 2023.

"The new school will provide an opportunity for an entirely new generation to have an education — something which was not on the cards for many of parents and grandparents because of war. Meeting a 70 year old man, beginning his education journey as a student in Primary 1 (our equivalent of Junior Infants) was truly humbling. This was his first chance at an education."

Transforming Lives Through Holistic Education

We continued to support our partner JRS Lebanon on the Jbeil Early Childhood Education program, where they are making a remarkable impact on the lives of young students through holistic education. The program provides:

- High quality Early Childhood Education
- Learning Support
- Summer camp
- Speech Therapy
- Counselling
- Recreation

Twin brothers, Ward and Zain Talib, enrolled in the program. The twins' mother, Rawaa Al-Rawas, shares this holistic and inclusive approach, where every student is treated equally regardless of their background, race or abilities has led to a real transformation in her children. She explained that her boys faced challenges in pronouncing words, forming phrases correctly, and comprehending questions. However, thanks to the consistent follow-up provided by JRS Jbeil, their pronunciation skills have improved significantly. Rawaa's children can now organize their words, distinguish

between questions and responses, and construct coherent sentences. She expresses deep gratitude for this comprehensive program that is supporting both children and parents refugees.

"My name is Ward, I am seven years old, I live with my father and mother, and I have a brother, his name is Zain. I enjoy going to school, studying, playing, and spending time with my friends. I love my school because they look after me and help me study and play. I also enjoy speaking with the speech therapist."

Improve protection of those most vulnerable within our care and surrounding communities

We are committed to cultivating a culture of care of the excluded grounded in dignity, justice, and reconciliation in China, Ethiopia, Kenya, Lebanon, South Sudan and Syria.

We championed safeguarding and protection not only with our own 43 partners in the Global South, but beyond that — with 13 other Xavier Network members (Jesuit NGOs and Mission Offices) whose partners span across 87 countries.

We provided life saving relief distributions for those facing starvation in Ethiopia. We provided winter clothing to children in Syria at risk of freezing. Our interventions have been critical and immediate, reaching those left furthest behind.



Tigray Conflict

The violent conflict in Tigray, Ethiopia left innocent people without enough food, shelter, or clean drinking water. 2 million fled their homes as hospitals, schools and factories were shelled. Many were massacred. Despite a truce in November 2022, 20 million people remain in dire need of food assistance in Ethiopia.

Through the Diocese of Adigrat your funding has provided relief food and supplies to over 10,000 people that were at risk of starvation.

Survivor Support

Uzima (meaning 'full of life') addresses the protection needs of vulnerable community members in Kangemi slum in Nairobi, targeting:

- Persons living with HIV
- · Adolescent girls and young women
- Adolescent boys and young men
- Single mothers
- Survivors of sexual and gender-based violence

The programme provides counselling and psychosocial support to many of whom are victims of abuse and violence. Survivors are accompanied to police stations and hospitals, with legal support and follow-up home visits.

Smiles through the bitter cold

With the generous support of our donors during our Winter Appeal 2022, we were able to provide winter kits to 1,925 children and cash distributions of €170 to 333 families in Syria to buy fuel throughout the harsh winter.

The fuel crisis led to businesses closing down and transport coming to a complete halt. Food prices surged, further exacerbating the suffering of Syrian families who have endured 11 years of conflict.

Many parents and caregivers called the Bab Sbaa Centre in Homs with thanks for the winter kits. One of the mothers was emotional when she shared:

"these items cost even more than we have, so buying these things for my son was impossible and we are so grateful." "This is the first time I wear a Jacket! Am so happy that it's new and especially for me!"

- 4,425 (2,213 f, 2,212 m) received diesel to heat their tents during the freezing winter months

South Sudan

- Relief supplies provided to 2,500 people (1,500 f, 1,000 m) in Maban during flash floods
- 4 large tents erected on the JRS Maban compound to accommodate students displaced from the flooding
- Plastic sheets provided to 2,000 households in Maban to repair homes destroyed by the floods
- Blankets provided to 200 vulnerable people in Maban affected by the floods

Syria

- Winter coats and shoes provided to 2,000 vulnerable people in Syria during freezing months
- Diesel provided to 2,000 vulnerable people to heat their homes and tents during winter
- Relief food distributed to 600 children and 100 elderly in Aleppo, Homes, Al Kafroun and Damascus



OBJECTIVE 3:

Promote good health and well-being

Ensuring healthy lives and promoting wellbeing for people at all ages is essential to sustainable development. Significant efforts are needed to fully eradicate a wide range of diseases and address many different persistent and emerging health issues.



In 2022, we continued to focus on the physical and psychosocial health of communities of refugees and other low-income vulnerable groups in various projects in countries including India, Kenya, South Sudan, and Uganda.

The Difference Porridge Makes

Fuel prices soared in South Sudan in 2022 – the effects of the Ukraine war affecting even this part of the globe. Food became more costly to transport and simple staples became out of reach for vulnerable homes. Often in these circumstances, the international community would respond with relief food, but this year was different. The Ukraine response had diverted not only attention but funds for the scale of humanitarian relief that was needed in South Sudan.

Our partner Loyola Secondary School in Wau provides a beacon of hope to many vulnerable students who struggle not just with school fees, but struggle to feed themselves from one day to the next. With hefty fee waivers for vulnerable students, this day school it is growing its reputation as one the best schools in the state. At the same time, Fr Jean Baptiste SJ, LSS Principal explained "our students rely on the food they get here during their school day to sustain them... there's simply nothing at home for them to eat."



"We witnessed the harrowing effects of food prices soaring during our Nov 2022 monitoring visit. Students were fainting each day. The school day had to be shortened as the students were physically too weak to stay in class until 3pm"

Psychosocial Support in Maban

The Mabanese people in South Sudan are hosting refugees from the north (Sudan), in a place that is already almost inhabitable for themselves. There are no roads in, or out, of Maban. People fleeing conflict walked for days and weeks to get here, with only what they could carry through the bush. Others travelled by river, which has now become too dangerous due to bandits. Refugees are traumatised, with many having experienced extreme violence and loss. Your support facilitated JRS provide individual and group counselling and physiotherapy to children with physical disabilities. Flash floods in 2022 added to the trauma, with homes being washed away and animals drowned.

The Mabanese show us what resilience really means - to persevere despite tragedy after tragedy.



"We had no rain. There was rain in the mountains in Ethiopia, not here in South Sudan. But the water table rose suddenly, water coming up from the ground. I'd never seen it before like this. Within 30 minutes, the water was up to my knees. The river burst its banks, the bridge collapsed. Some people didn't make it home in time to get their children. Homes were washed away."

Care for our Common Home

Our work in 2022 focused on promoting sustainable farming and supports smallholder farmers and female heads of households in preparedness to reduce their risk to shocks and stresses, including environmental disasters, climate change and violent conflict.

We continued to champion gender, with our focus on female headed households on many of the farms and trainings we supported in Malawi, South Sudan, and Zambia.

Our activities led to real long-term impacts including:

- 51% of participants using organic manure instead of pesticides on their crops
- 616 farmers income increased by €46 as a result of climate resilient farming training and Village Savings and Loan Schemes
- Improvement in nutritional rates by 51% in vulnerable households

Climate Action Award

We were so proud when our partner, MAJIS Rumbek was given the Misean Cara 2022 Climate Action Award.

Multi-educational and Agricultural Jesuit Institute of South Sudan (MAJIS) addresses food insecurity in 288 villages. The project focuses on sustainable farming, good agricultural practice & appropriate land use.

Local women farmers are trying to cope with climate change — with rains coming late and seasons unpredictable. In the last 3 years, there has been unprecedented floods as soon the rainy season begins, destroying crops, drowning animals, destroying roads and bridges.

In 2022, your support has facilitated the training and support of 172 female farmers like Akujur Rualdit in climate resilience, spacing, pest control, disease control, harvesting techniques and 125 female farmers on free range poultry production and marketing.

Akujur has 6 children, the youngest is 1 and oldest is 13. She grows a variety of crops including Sukuma wiki (Collard greens), Okra, Kudra (like kale), Amaranth (a type of grain) and Pumpkin leaves. The crops are used for both consumption and as a source of income.



"We used to only eat one meal during the evening hours, but now we are able to eat two meals a day,"

The Tasintha Project

"Tasintha" – Building resilience of farming communities in Kasungu, Malawi, to the impacts of climate change – is the flagship project of the Jesuit Centre for Ecology and Development (JCED).

The Tasintha project aims to create a productive and resilient society for small-scale farmers in Kasungu District, Malawi through increased livelihood opportunities, enhanced food security and improved nutrition. The project promotes improved green, climate-resilient farming practices.

JCED has worked closely with farming communities providing training on climate smart methods of agriculture, most notably agroforestry. JCED has bolstered the work of a women's group who manufacture clay eco-stoves used for cooking. These stoves are up to 60% more efficient at burning wood than open fires, meaning communities don't have to cut down as many trees. The production and sale of the eco-stoves provide women with an additional stream of income.

"I now help my husband paying school fees for our children as he is looking after inputs for our next growing season. All this is possible because we now make decisions together as a family."

GOAL 2: SCHOOL ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME

To promote active engagement within Jesuit Schools in Ireland on global injustice

Jesuit School Teacher Placement Initiative

Our Jesuit School Placement Initiative provides specialised professional assignments to personnel working in Irish Jesuit schools with our partners overseas. Each individual placement is bespoke — tailored to the experience and qualifications of the personnel in Ireland and the specific piece of work needing support within our partner. The Initiative strengthens support to our partners in a professional and cost effective way, addressing real-time needs at field level.

We look forward to Gonzaga Teacher, Ursula Sharpe, starting her placement in 2023.

Jesuit Alumni Volunteering Programme

Past pupils of Irish Jesuit Schools, once qualified in their professions, are encouraged to join our Volunteering Programme. In 2022, former Belvedere Head Boy, Sam Duff, volunteered with our partner JCED in Malawi.

His placement was so successful, Sam plans to dedicate himself to the sector, and will be doing a masters in International Development in 2023. It's such a privilege to be able to impact on our Alumni.

Transition Year Student Engagement initiative

2022 was busy with TY students from the Jesuit schools in Ireland visiting us on social placements and 1 week work placement programmes. Our initiative promotes social justice, challenging youth to understand how the way we live in Ireland impacts on those most vulnerable in the Global South. The placement challenges pre-conceptions and encourages youth to consider further education that can lead them into the social justice and international development sector.

Our most liveliest week at IJI was when 8 Clongowes art students joined us to paint a Laudato Sí mural in our garden. Niall Leahy SJ gave an inspirational talk on Laudato Sí which prompted the students to put together some designs for a mural with their art teacher. Accomplished Syrian artist, Manar Al-Shouha, accompanied the students during the painting — which was not only led to an impressive piece of work, but a rich exchange across cultures and generations.

Our Irish Jesuit Schools committed tirelessly in appeals throughout 2022 including the:

Our schools built on their individual relationships with Jesuit schools overseas. Belvedere College furthered their partnership with Loyola Secondary School in Wau, South Sudan, supporting them on the construction of a Vocational Centre classroom block. LSS Wau Students sent video messages to Belvedere with Christmas greeting and look forward to exchanges in the future.








GOAL 3: MISSIONARY SUPPORT PROGRAMME

To provide quality support to Irish Jesuit missionaries while on mission



60 years in Japan

Fr Pedro Arrupe SJ, once Vice Provincial of Japan, spoke about the delicate sensitivity of the Japanese and their natural goodness and courtesy. He said that they were a gentle people who placed great importance on the feelings of others and were good listeners. He pointed out that they felt close to nature, and that they were not embarrassed by silence. He wrote that the Japanese had curious minds and would not be won over by reason alone, but also by cariño, using the Spanish word for 'affection and warmth'.

In 1977, I was moved to Tokyo and taught part-time in Sophia University. I found that in working with the students was becoming more aware of the presence of God. Many think there is 'something/some mysterious power out there', but they are not too interested in finding out. I notice that when you tell a person that 'they are never alone and that God dwells in them', this gives them consolation. I have found that my own faith is being refined all the time by living in this non-religious, non-faith environment.

Looking back on these nearly 60 years in Japan, I thank the Lord for the wonderful Novice Master I was blessed with, Fr. Donal O'Sullivan, the Jesuit who opened my mind and my heart to the wider world and set me on the road to spiritual discernment. I thank the Irish Province for the support and encouragement it has shown me from the beginning.

I thank my parents and family who with great love and understanding have always shared in my missionary life in Japan. I thank the Japanese Province, which is so international and Japanese at the same time, for accepting me as their brother. I thank the Japanese people for everything that I am today.

Our Board of Advisors met 3 times in 2022 and Board of Trustees met twice, providing guidance and reviewing staff quarterly reports, policies, our Governance Compliance Form for the Charities Regulator, our Financial Statements and external audit.

We have a middle tier of oversight of each of our projects, known as Development Offices or in the case of JRS — Country or Regional Offices. In 2022, we collaborated closely with the below oversight bodies:
